PROJECT JUSTIFICATION

Douglas County Recreational Area Playground Equipment Replacement LWCF Grant Application 2025





a. Who will be served by this project?

The project consists of adding new playground equipment to Douglas County's Recreation Area that replaces the old equipment currently in the area. The main piece of equipment will be a mega-tower playground structure for children ages 5 to 12. Other items include a set of regular swings, a tire swing, a spring rider, and two benches for seating.

Located by Corsica Lake and Dakota Trails Golf Course, Douglas County Recreation Area is a major recreational asset for the County and the region. The recreation area features camping sites, bathhouses, a picnic shelter, walking trails, a fishing dock, and a playground.

The highlight of the recreation area is its location by Corsica Lake. Family households dominate the living arrangements in Douglas County (71.6%). 11.4% of the County's population is reported to have a disability of some sort. The majority of those claiming a disability reported having an ambulatory difficulty. The greater region in a 25-mile radius around Douglas County has a population of 14,860. Charles Mix and Aurora Counties, adjacent to Douglas County, have grown by an average of 1.5% over the past ten years.

Those groups benefiting from the proposed playground upgrades are summarized below:

Children: At the core, children are the primary beneficiaries. The new equipment offers them a world of adventure and discovery. It's here that they develop gross and fine motor skills, as they climb, swing, and slide. They learn about balance, coordination, and the physical limits they can push beyond. According to the Census Bureau, preschool (under 5 years old) and school-age (5 to 17 years) children comprise 26.2% of the County's population.

Families: Families find a common ground in playgrounds. Parents and guardians watch over their little ones, often joining in the fun. It's a place where busy schedules give way to the simple pleasure of spending time together. New playground equipment means new experiences and opportunities for families to create memories and enhance their camping experience.

Educators: Educators see playgrounds as extensions of the classroom. The equipment serves as practical tools in teaching children about physics, mathematics, and the natural world. They observe as children learn social skills like

sharing and cooperation, which are as vital as any academic lesson. The kindergarten teacher in Armour is an avid, nationally known birder and nature enthusiast. She takes her classes to the Douglas County Recreation Area every year for a field trip. She has asked the Commission if new equipment was a possibility.

Community Leaders: For the County Commissions and towns in the County, new playground equipment means progress. It's a visible commitment to the well-being of the County's residents. Playgrounds can become hubs of community events, fostering a sense of belonging and pride. They also know that such installations can attract more visitors, boosting the local economy.

The Disabled: Inclusive playground equipment breaks barriers, allowing children with disabilities to play alongside their peers. It's a testament to a community's commitment to inclusivity, where every child, regardless of ability, can experience the joy of play.

b. Analysis of need for the completion of this project

The equipment in question is nearly 40 years old, and much of it is no longer safe for children to use. Additionally, a significant portion of the playground is not accessible to individuals with disabilities. The County is also unable to obtain replacement parts for the current structures, meaning the slide and swings must be removed to comply with the latest safety standards set by the Consumer Product Safety Commission. Images of the existing playground equipment are included in the attachments.

Upgrading the playground at the Douglas County Recreation Area is a key priority for both the County's recreational and economic development goals. The County is fully committed to completing the project in 2026, and the requested LWCF funds will be essential in making this a reality.

c. Goals and objectives to be met

The objective of this project is to enhance outdoor recreational opportunities for the children of Douglas County. The Douglas County Recreation Area is a popular destination for families, with many children playing in the park when the weather permits. Upgrading the play equipment will improve the park's value and provide local children and families with years of enjoyment, further solidifying the park as a community asset.

A broader aim of this project, as well as the Recreation Area in general, is to celebrate the natural beauty of the "Prairie Potholes" that are abundant in Douglas County. These features are not merely geographical landmarks; they are vital ecosystems, rich in

biodiversity, and stand as a testament to the enduring legacy of glaciers that once shaped the northern Great Plains over millennia.

The prairie potholes of South Dakota are an essential refuge for wildlife, particularly migratory waterfowl. More than 50% of North America's migratory waterfowl depend on these areas for breeding and feeding. The region's shallow lakes, marshes, fertile soil, and warm summers make it one of the world's most significant wetland ecosystems. Prairie potholes are not only crucial for the survival of various species but also serve as natural flood control systems, absorbing rain, snowmelt, and floodwaters, thereby reducing the risk and severity of downstream flooding. These natural treasures warrant both respect and protection.

d. Describe the proposed action and alternatives

This project will remove the unsafe and outdated playground equipment and replace it with accessible and safe equipment for children. Without the funding of this grant, the playground will likely remain as it sits today. Unfit and unsafe equipment will need to be removed due to safety and liability concerns, but there will not be funds to replace them. Therefore, the playground would become much smaller, and likely fewer children would have the opportunity to utilize the outdoor space and spend time enjoying the beautiful recreational area.

Design South Dakota (Design:SD) was an AIA South Dakota program comprised of architects, landscape architects, urban designers, planners, and other experts in design and community development. Begun in 2006, its volunteer teams worked in several communities in rural South Dakota, helping them to develop shared visions for improving their physical and environmental designs.

Design:SD's first visit was to Corsica, South Dakota in 2007. As part of the three-day

workshop, the team visited several locations in and around Corsica, including the Douglas County Recreation Area at Corsica Lake. One of the final presentation boards included a visionary concept for the Recreation Area (shown at right). The concept illustrated more park development where the campground currently sits.



However, updates such as

adding additional campsites, a new boat dock, and a fishing dock paired with the improvements made to the adjacent golf course have proven to be the right decisions.

People who camp at the recreation area frequently and use the facilities have been asking for new equipment for several years. The insurance company has also been telling the Commission for years that the playground equipment should be updated or removed. It has been discussed at commissioner meetings as well as during the budget process. There is money budgeted in the park budget for repairs and maintenance in the amount of \$50,000.00 for 2024. The budgeted amount is for materials for a new bathhouse and stairs. The remainder of the budgeted funds will go towards the County's match.

ii. What information was made available to the public for review and comment? Did the sponsor provide written responses addressing the comments? If so, include responses.

The public had a wonderful opportunity to provide their thoughts and ideas about the rec area during the Design South Dakota program. Since the concept was first developed, residents in the county and county commissioners continue to talk about the great need for updated equipment, as well as the liability issues that could occur if updates are not completed.

The project has been discussed at recent county commission meetings. The application was also uploaded to the county's website for people to review and provide comments (see screenshot below from the Douglas County website).

e. Public comment periods and agency response – include how long the comment period was, when in the process was it completed, and who was invited to comment

The public comment period started when the LWCF application was discussed at the April commission meeting. This period continued while the application was available on the county website on April 14. Comments were accepted from everyone.

f. When will the project be completed and open for public outdoor recreation use?

Assume that successful applicants will have access to grant funds by spring 2026.

The City will be ready to begin the project immediately after notification of the award, ideally in the spring of 2026. The exact timing of the work activity will depend on the vendor's availability, but City staff will be available at a moment's notice to do any pre-work site prep that may be needed.

g. What strategies in the 2023 SCORP support your project? Explain how each strategy applies to your project

The 2023 SCORP provides ample justification for this project. The 2023 Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (SCORP), Strategy #1 page 3.4, states, "Provide and promote year-round, diverse outdoor recreation opportunities for South Dakotans of all ages, interests, economic status and ability." The strategy is supported by the first objective, "Develop additional diverse outdoor recreational facilities and renovate/replace existing ones to meet current demands." The strategy is further supported by the objective, "Provide more universally accessible outdoor recreation facilities and opportunities" and action, "Design and construct outdoor recreation facilities for varying ages, mobility and ability levels, especially playgrounds, trails and the like, so that multiple age and mobility groups can enjoy the experience." The proposed playground improvement project is consistent with priorities that are ranked as "high" (page 3.6) under Strategy 1.


The project ultimately aligns with **Strategy #2** on page 3.7 of the 2023 SCORP: "Maintain and improve existing park and recreation areas, open spaces, and facilities for outdoor recreation opportunities." Playgrounds are a high priority for all classes of cities in the state under Strategy 2, "Projects that maintain, improve or update existing outdoor recreation facilities, when the availability of other federal matching fund programs is not possible or practical. Projects may include playgrounds, sports courts and fields, trails and tracks, swimming pools and other renovated facilities."



Douglas County Commissioner Meeting Minutes April 1, 2025

PURSUANT TO ADJOURNMENT The Board of County Commissioners met at the Douglas County Courthouse in Armour, SD at 9:00 a.m. on Tuesday, April 1, 2025. Members present were Dan Koedam, Marlin Maas, Lori Sparks, Jerod Star and Jim Werkmeister. Auditor Phyllis Barker was also present. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited. A motion was made by Star and seconded by Werkmeister to adopt the agenda. All members voted in favor of this action; motion carried.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

At 9:05 a.m. a motion was made Koedam and seconded by Werkmeister to enter executive session pursuant to SDCL 1-25-2 (1). All members voted in favor of this action; motion carried. Chairperson Sparks declared the meeting back to open session at 9:29 a.m. with no action taken.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Brad Ellwanger, Highway Superintendent, and Callie Nichols, Assistant Highway Superintendent, met with the Board to discuss their department. Ellwanger asked for clarification on the overtime policy. Ellwanger would like his crew to continue working if they are working on a project that is near completion at the end of a workday as opposed to hauling all equipment back to the shop and starting again the next day. The board agreed that it would be in the best interest of the county to allow for overtime hours to be flexed out in the same work week, if this is not possible, overtime pay will be at discretion of the Department Head.

Dust Control and road reclaiming were discussed. It was agreed that areas with dust control already applied will still be reclaimed and reshaped so that water is not standing on the roads. It will be the responsibility of the landowners to re-apply dust control if they feel it is necessary once the road is reshaped.

379th Street north of New Holland is scheduled to be resurfaced this year. There are two culverts that need to be replaced prior to the overlay. A motion was made by Maas and seconded by Werkmeister to approve the quote from Dave VanderPol Construction to complete the project at a cost of \$24,600 plus the additional cost of the culverts. All members voted in favor of this action; motion carried.

TIF DISTRICTS

Jessica Goehring, Director of Equalization, and Phyllis Barker, Auditor, met with the Board to discuss the TIF District implementation process and the possibility of establishing an administrative fee. Craig Parkhurst, States Attorney, was also present. Discussion was held with no action taken at this time.

SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT

Sheriff Lau, Chief Deputy Powers and Craig Parkhurst, States Attorney met with the Board. Lau informed the Board that Powers' sixth month probation will be completed as of April 7th. No action was taken at this time.

Mental Health holds and the need for someone to sit with these individuals at the hospital while they go through the mental health hold process was discussed. A motion was made by Werkmeister and seconded by Star to hire Pat Harrington as a Mental Health Attendant on an as needed basis to oversee the mental health hold process if the need arises at a rate of \$25.00 per hour. All members voted in favor of this action; motion carried.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

At 11:03 a.m., a motion was made by Koedam seconded by Maas to enter into executive session pursuant to SDCL 1-25-2 (1). All members voted in favor of this action; motion carried. Chairperson Sparks declared the meeting back to open session at 11:37 a.m. with no action taken.

Chief Deputy Powers brought concerns to the Board about the holiday pay policy for the one month of payroll that the Sheriff's Deputies were paid as hourly employees. Discussion was held. It was agreed upon that the full-time Sheriff's Deputies shall receive retroactive holiday pay for the recognized holidays paid out on January payroll.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

At 11:55 a.m. a motion was made by Werkmeister and seconded by Maas to enter executive session pursuant to SDCL 1-25-2 (1). All members voted in favor of this action; motion carried. Chairperson Sparks declared the meeting back to open session at 12:26 p.m. with no action taken.

LWCF GRANT

A motion was made by Star and seconded by Maas to introduce the following resolution:. All members voted in favor of this action; motion carried.

That <u>Lori Sparks, Chairperson</u> is hereby authorized to execute and file an application on behalf of the <u>Douglas County Commission</u> with the National Park Service, U.S. Department of the Interior, through the State of South Dakota, Department of Game, Fish, and Parks, Division of Parks and Recreation, for an LWCF grant to aid in financing the <u>Playground Update Project</u> for the <u>Douglas County Recreation Area in Douglas County</u>, South Dakota and its Environs.
- 2. That <u>Phyllis Barker</u>, <u>Auditor of Douglas County</u> is hereby authorized and directed to furnish such information as the above mentioned federal and/or state agencies may reasonably request in connection with the application which is hereby authorized to be filed.
- 3. That <u>Douglas County</u> shall provide a minimum of 50% of the total cost of the project; and will assume all responsibility in the operation and maintenance of the project upon completion of construction, for the reasonable life expectancy of the facility.
